

Upcoming WorkKeys Changes–WorkKeys 2.0

On June 1, ACT released a new version of the WorkKeys

assessment. This new version has several significant changes,



including different assessment names, items and scoring scales. Currently, the updated WorkKeys assessment is only available online, and retesting on the new version will not be available until the vendor releases multiple forms. This version will be available to Ohio schools through the WorkKeys testing portal for Ohio on October 1.

ACT will keep the original version of the WorkKeys assessment operational in its testing portal for Ohio through September 30. Ohio will then transition to the new version of WorkKeys on October 1.

Because the scoring scales differ between versions 1 and 2 of the WorkKeys test, **students must complete all three sections of the WorkKeys test from the same version of the assessment**. If you have students who would like to retest on all or part of the original WorkKeys assessment or would like to complete a section of the original WorkKeys that they have not yet taken, those students must test on WorkKeys version 1 by September 30, 2017.

Team Ohio & Career Centers Readying for Workplace Internships

With school back in session, the Columbus City Career Centers and our State of Ohio partners, under the direction of Cullen Jackson, Department of Administrative Services, and Cheryl Cooper, Columbus Downtown High School, (CDHS) have begun holding discussions, and making plans to continue to offer workshops and internship opportunities for senior students at Columbus Downtown High School and Ft. Hayes Career Center. Team Ohio is comprised of human resource directors from the following agencies: Administrative Services, Health, Youth Services, Public Utilities, Transportation, and others. Last year, Team Ohio employed approximately 25 students. With more state agencies coming on board this school year, more internships are anticipated for our students.

To kick off the partnership around mid-October, Team Ohio staff will create a PowerPoint sharing information about the organization. It will address the do's and don'ts for completing résumés, cover letters, applications, mock interviews, and dressing for success.

The workshop provides just-in-time, relevant information to help students better prepare for the next stage of the partnership, which is getting ready for the interview. Immediately after the presentation, students create or update their résumés based on what they learned from teachers and staff of Team Ohio. In November, the agencies will begin posting their job openings, and students begin to apply for the much sought after positions.

To meet the goal of having students placed before winter break, Team Ohio identifies students to interview and interviews are arranged either at CDHS or at the agency site. This is very competitive and there are often as many as 25 students applying for the same position. To further assist students, feedback is provided after each interview on how students performed. The students can use the feedback to improve future interviews.

From January through May, the students will be mentored by business partners and they will have a chance to learn from the experts in their field. For many of our students this is a first-time experience in the work environment. Based on the comments received from not only the students but their mentors, it is an experience that cannot be duplicated by staying in the classroom.

In addition to preparing students for internships, business partners provide other areas of support. Business partners mentoring students contribute finances and equipment, serve on advisory boards, and critique student presentations, just to name a few.
